### New Year's Message from Rabbi Seth

We really don't know what's going to happen to our world. The convulsions we're going through have shaken public confidence in prospects for an eventual return to normalcy. Jewish time's familiar festival cycle and forward-looking messianic challenge, its *keva* (fixed routines and predictable patterns) and kavanah (keen sense of moral purpose), would have us aspire to something coherent, meaningful and noble. How do our revered religious rhythms play against the discordant noises emanating, these days, from citadels of power? What can our spiritual practices—the upcoming holidays when we congregate to improve ourselves—say to address a moment so disorienting and terrifying as this?

Let's take one current event and see it through the prism of Jewish spirituality. Black Lives Matter has resurged as a civic movement. Racist oppression, baked into the walls of American history, isn't a foregone conclusion—a perpetual historical inevitability: the edifice of hate could crumble. BLM comes in a particularistic form (the demands of Black Power) to broadcast a universalistic message: human decency can prevail! The message is a Jewish one; we share it with and learn it from our sister religions, our brethren cultures.

There are, admittedly, and always have been Jews who favor the shtetl over Tel Aviv—not broadminded, secularly aware, multicultural, future-thinking community but religiously traditional, narrowly clustered ethnocentric faith in home and synagogue. However, such an attitude belongs to a shrinking (if loud, self-aggrandizing) minority. We don't have to view our non-Jewish neighbors with antagonism; we can be in alliance with them. Black lives matter to us because they contribute to the well-being of the global community which sustains us as well.

Most Jews know cooperation and science, not isolation and superstition, are what promote well-being for ourselves along with everybody else. The insight is not unique to the Children of Israel. Neither is the insistence on affirming the common humanity of this planet's inhabitants despite our painfully honest assessment of the disappointing social reality—the negative way people treat each other all too often. The African-American community, like the Jewish, suffers mistreatment but still demands fairness and cries out for civility, still works to make a better society. What is unique to Jews is our longevity in the striving for peace and justice; we've been at this struggle longer than anyone else, and we keep that counterintuitive, pure-hearted flame of hope burning.

The Jewish people's very survival in the shadow of horrible, unrelenting man-made evil is a hopeful sign; we bear witness by enduring injustice as well as acting for righteousness. So now, facing a dreadful, convoluted historical crisis—a mixed mayhem of environmental disruption, viral pandemic and political unrest—arising from powerful men's reckless depravity, Jews have a choice: whether to keep advancing the cause of decency, generosity, kindness; to be active witnesses for the sake of the good; to not give up on the world. Can we stay true to our mission: helping to lead the way and thereby holding fast to the commands of our ancient holy covenant?

Let us stare down and subdue the present evil—not for the sake of a return to normalcy but, as our Biblical prophets exhorted, to create a better, nobler normal: to turn today's perilous, lonely uncertainties into tomorrow's unmitigated, shared blessings.

May your New Year be filled with the enlightening, enlivening spirit of Divine Hope.

### Message from your president

Dear TBT family and friends. It is hard to believe that this is my last High Holiday message to all of you! I am entering my tenth year of being your executive leader, wow! Unfortunately, this is our year of reckoning. The Covid pandemic struck in March and TBT was forced to close its doors to in-person activities. Lucky for us, Seth held Shabbat services and Torah study via Zoom so we could still have our spiritual connection to TBT. Barry Goldberg, our treasurer was able to secure an SBA Paycheck Protection Program loan to help cover Seth's salary till the end of our fiscal year. And then there was tropical storm Isaias. No power, no AC to protect our precious Torah scrolls. It took down most of our birch tree, Maurice and caused significant damage to our Felicia bench in front. And then our 5-ton AC unit totally fried. Could anything get worse? Yes, it could. We are starting a New Year unable to use our beloved building for services, and as a rental property that supplemented our small income substantially. We have a financial obligation as a congregation to pay Rabbi Seth's salary until his retirement at the end of June 2021. That being said, I implore each and every one of you to not abandon TBT at this time. We need you to pay your 2020-2021 dues in a timely fashion and dig deep for your Yom Kippur appeal contribution.

I remind you that Kathi and I are retiring as of June 30, 2021. We will not alter this decision. Therefore, in order to maintain an effective congregation at TBT, we need a leadership person who will take the reins of the executive board. If you can help, please call me at 860-828-3377. The future of TBT is in your hands. The final decision is up to YOU!

And so on a more gentle note, I close by extending wishes to you and your families for a sweet, happy and prosperous New Year filled with love, good health, and peace. Le Shanah Tova.




### Maurice intact before storm.







The Felicia Shpall memorial bench was hit hard and TBT's sign was clipped but Dave Forrest has reattached it.



### Harold Reflects...

From time to time The Star calls on senior member Harold Nevins to reflect on TBT's rich history...you may remember his last article which recalled the design and construction of the Lions of Judah that grace TBT's bima, the gift of the Carlin Family....

Here he reflects on the Matriarch of Temple Beth Torah.

The tall tree in front of TBT was shaken to its roots by that last hurricane. It was a white birch planted by a member of the congregation in memory of her husband, Maurice. Helena Kavalier was her name. Most members never met her. She was sent to TBT by the Almighty to look after all the children in our religious school. At that time we had forty children in various grades. It was a wonderful marriage but Maurice was taken early and then Helena dedicated the rest of her life to TBT and the children. It was fitting that as a living memorial she planted a tree that was beautiful and strong and thrived. Cy Levine often spoke of Helena and Maurice because she met Maurice in a 5 & 10 cent store owned by Maurice's family in the same shopping center where Cy and his brother Don had a pharmacy.

The tree struggled against the elements of Hurricane Isaias and when it could



resist no longer two trunks broke off and crashed down on electric wires and the Felicia memorial bench. One trunk remained that reminds me of a V. V for victory and saying we won and we will grow stronger for future generations.

In our archives we had a photo of Cy and Helena dancing. Ah yes, do you remember? WHEN? DO YOU? Rita reminds me that Helena would make a gift of a crocheted covered hanger or a toilet paper cover as a token of her appreciation. Her calling was teaching young children. Sadly the rest of the tree must come down before it falls in the next storm and causes serious damage. Hopefully another birch will be planted as a reminder of Helena's faith and dedication.
