Rabbi Alan's Message...

In most cultures, acceptance by the surrounding culture is desired by the individual. As Jews, we have desired to be accepted as equals in the societies where we reside. In the United States we have been very fortunate to enjoy the greatest freedom that our people have ever experienced outside of our own country.

Joseph, favored son of Jacob, was our first role model of success as a stranger in a foreign culture. He rose to the greatest heights of power in Egypt and is credited with saving the world from starvation. His success continued in the choices made by his offspring for their own lives. For many years they were isolated as the only family of Hebrews in an idolatrous nation. Joseph's personal success was the conveyance of his belief and faith to his children. Here we have Joseph's family, aristocrats in Egyptian society and firmly rooted in their devotion and faith to God despite the influences of the surrounding culture.

In the last Parsha of the book of Genesis, Vayechi, we find Jacob at the end of his life. Before he is ready to die, he wants to bless all his children individually. The blessing that is significant for us today is the one that he gave to his two grandsons, Ephraim and Menashe. These boys, in the face of great adversity, had kept the traditions of their father and grandfather alive, and Jacob saw and acknowledged that. In other respects, they made great strides and were successful in Egyptian society and were able to keep their traditions.

From this we learn about living in two worlds at the same time.

Most of us live and participate in the secular world equally with others from many different cultures. Some of us continue to make significant efforts to keep our Judaism active in our lives and the lives of our children, thereby emulating the actions of Joseph's sons. To encourage us, there is a custom to bless our children each Friday night saying, "May God make you like Ephraim and Menashe" for boys, and "May God make you like Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah" for girls.

The only way that Judaism will survive is if we ensure it. Just living life and hoping our children will follow a Jewish path because we want them to will not work. It is up to all of us, all members of the community, not just the parents, to set the right examples, by applying Jewish values to our lives, and keeping the traditions and spirit of Judaism intact.

It is only with a proactive approach that we will be capable of perpetuating a Jewish way of life for the coming generations.

What is the alternative? Is there an alternative? What are you doing to ensure Jewish continuity?

- Enhanced Security Measures
- Facility Improvements, Beautification and Repairs

We are currently working on approvals for new doors and locks.

We are also exploring plans for a better ramp at the Social Hall entrance of the building.

We have received a sub-award for a Federal Security Grant, pending several requirements (Historic District Commission approval and an Environmental Review) that must be fulfilled prior to the actual grant award. This grant requires us to spend our own funds and then seek reimbursement. This fundraiser was critical to our future success in this endeavor!

Michelle was a beloved wife, daughter, sister, aunt and friend to many.







It began with one candle, sharing it's light to ignite all of the other menorah candles around the room. Each of us brought a menorah from home.


Many candles can be kindled from one candle without diminishing it. (Talmud)
