Rabbi Alan's Message...

Questions, Sh'elot, Preguntas

With Passover coming, we are reminded that we are allowed, even encouraged to ask questions. The Passover Haggadah even ensures that questions are asked. Perhaps the most famous passage in the Haggadah is the "Ma Nish-ta-na" which is not actually a question but a declaration, a noticing: "How different this night is from all other nights!" This paragraph is recited by the youngest person (not necessarily a child) at the Seder. For most Jewish children, this may be their first experience of public speaking, public questioning. The questions pertain to asking the reasons behind the holiday's rituals, for example: On all other nights, we eat all kinds of bread, why tonight do we only eat Matza?" The remainder of the Haggadah is designed to answer the child's questions.

Another well-known passage speaks of four children: one wise, one thoughtless, one simple, and one too young to ask questions. We are told that no two children are alike; they study in each their own way, and are developing their own style of living, which requires questioning. The reading describes the parents' responses to each child. And most parents recognize that their children are nothing alike.

The spirit of Passover is summarized in one characteristic teaching of the Haggadah: "In every generation, we are obligated to regard ourselves as if we personally were liberated from Egypt."

So, in the spirit of Passover, as we experience and reflect on our freedom and as we ask our questions, we at TBT are always asking questions pertaining to our growth, to what our future will look like.

Here are questions that we can add to our Seder:

How did you come to join TBT?

What are your needs and how have they changed?

How is the synagogue meeting your needs?

What do you enjoy the most about belonging to TBT?

What else can we do for you?

What do you have to offer us?

Any ideas how we can best reach out to unaffiliated Jews in the community?

Is there anything special that we can do to make you more comfortable as an interfaith family?

SELL YOUR CHAMETZ:

According to the "Shulchan Aruch," A Jew having leaven food in their possession during Passover is transgressing the precept: 'No leaven shall be seen with you.' 
TBT Hosts Wethersfield Methodist Church as part of their 200th Anniversary Celebration
